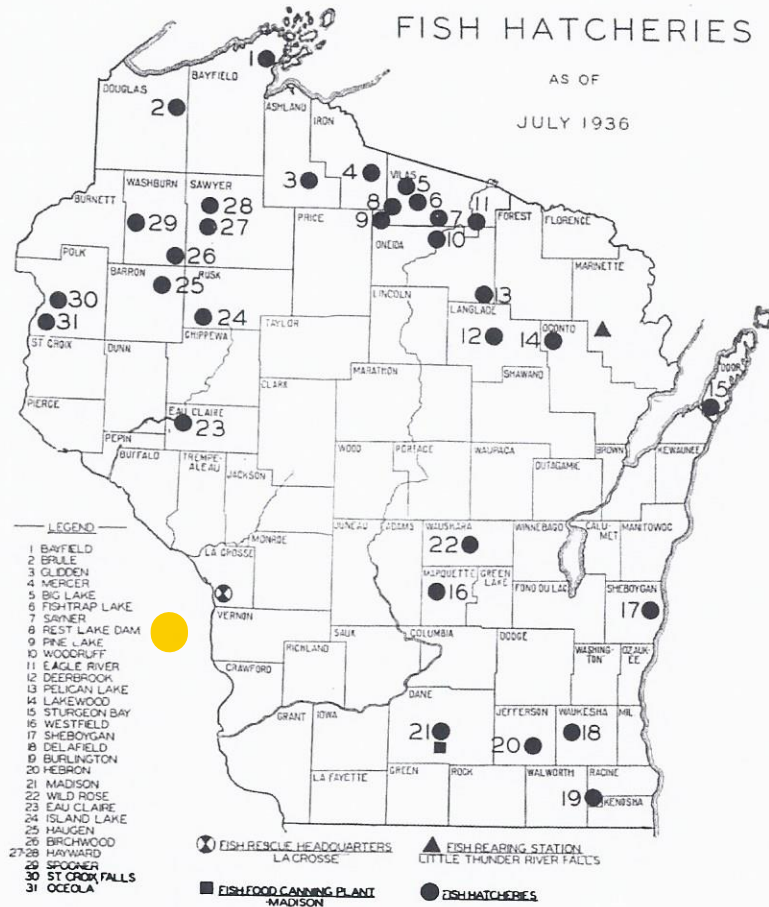

supplied their allotment the following year. During the past two years great accomplishments have been made in stocking smaller bodies of water with the fish that already predominate in them.

Transportation of fish for long distances has been greatly facilitated by the addition, in 1936, of two new Thompson oxygen tanks to our distribution equipment. The tanks can be easily attached to a truck and fish can be kept alive, if necessary, in the tanks for six or eight days by having the water continually aerated with oxygen supplied from oxygen drums. In addition to the two oxygen tanks purchased, a fleet of new pickup and ton and a half trucks was put into service to take the place of the older, undependable trucks.

In the year 1935 no major difficulties were experienced in distribution work, although the entire program was revised at that time. The extreme warm weather during 1936 made conditions very hazardous
